Sioux Falls One-Day Mystery Tour Itinerary

Arrive in Sioux Falls – late afternoon.

Free evening to explore Downtown Sioux Falls and [SculptureWalk](#)

SculptureWalk is an exciting annual exhibit of 56 outdoor sculptures displayed year-round in downtown Sioux Falls and ranges from abstract to whimsical. The collection is valued at over \$1 million and includes works from artists across the globe.

** Also in 2019 – The Arc of Dreams, a massive stainless steel permanent sculpture seven stories high and nearly the length of a football field will be installed over the Big Sioux River in the downtown area. Complimentary SculptureWalk - brochures/maps available for distribution.

Day 1

Morning

Begin your day with a visit to our namesake, "**The Falls**" of the **Big Sioux River**, a waterway system that has been flowing in its present course for over 10,000 years. The Falls have been a focus of life in the region throughout history when Native American people once inhabited the area. The Falls and the entire [Falls Park](#) are now a beautiful 123-acre focal point and serve as the backdrop for the city’s beautifully restored and vibrant downtown bursting with recreation, shopping and dining options. Make time to get a bird’s eye view from the five-story viewing tower inside the visitor center.

**** (Insider tip** – The Falls are photograph beautifully in the morning or early evening when the light reflects off both the water and the pink quartzite.) A complimentary 20-minute step-on guide can be arranged to give you a brief overview of the city.

Before you leave the Falls Park area, a must stop is the new [Stockyards Ag Experience](#) located a few steps north of the visitor center. The Stockyards Ag Experience tells the story of agriculture's impact in this region and takes the visitor on a journey through the history of the former Sioux Falls Stockyards from its opening in 1917 to its closure in 2009. In addition, vibrant historical images and high-tech interactive displays give a glimpse inside the world of food production and explains the process of farm-to-table. The Stockyards Ag Experience is a true tribute to the region's agricultural industry.

Mid-morning

[Good Earth State Park](#)

Located just a few miles southeast of Sioux Falls near the South Dakota-Iowa border sits several acres of pristine land rich in cultural history and preserved to keep its natural beauty. Good Earth State Park is one of South Dakota's newest state parks. The new 11,000 square-foot visitor center opened in 2017 and features a variety of exhibits and educational programming focused on the cultural and historical significance of the site.

The land, which sits along the Big Sioux River, was once inhabited by Native American civilization from 1300-1700 AD. The area was a popular site for settlement because of the river, the abundant wildlife, and fertile plains. It is believed that the occupants of the land were primarily Oneota Indigenous Peoples, including Omaha, Ioway, Oto and Yankton Sioux Tribes. No other Oneota site of this size and integrity is known to exist in the United States. Several different vantage points along the trails allow for spectacular vistas.

[USGS Earth Resources Observation and Science \(EROS\) Data Center](#)

U.S. Geological Survey Earth Resources Observation and Science (EROS) Center is a remotely sensed data management, systems development, and research field center for the U.S.

Geological Survey's (USGS) Area. Visitors will be fascinated by the geographical mapping of the world through the use of satellites and are able to view hundreds of the earth's images. EROS opened in the early 1970's and currently houses one of the largest computer complexes in the entire Department of the Interior. Guided group tours are free to the public M-F: 10a.m. and 2p.m. (50 minutes).

Mid-afternoon

[Strawbale Winery](#)

Imagine a winery made of strawbales. The remarkable insulating properties of strawbales means the winemakers are able to reduce the energy needs of the winery and recreate the controlled environment of cellars and caves that have always played an important part in the maturation of great wine. This innovative building material marries with the commitment to environmental sustainability and production of fine wine. Take a tour, experience a unique country setting all while enjoying a delightful wine tasting experience.

Late afternoon

[Old Courthouse Museum](#)

This restored, 1890's Richardsonian Romanesque building, constructed of native pink quartzite, is a National Historic Landmark that features an 1893 clock tower, a restored circuit courtroom and law library along with 16 wall murals painted from 1915 to 1917. Opened as a museum in 1974, the building houses permanent and changing exhibits focusing on the natural and cultural histories of the Siouxland region. The museum hosts lectures, workshops, astronomy programs, walking tours, and traditional music concerts year-round. No admission fee.

Dinner and evening entertainment options

[Washington Pavilion](#)

The Washington Pavilion is the region's premier cultural, educational and entertainment center located in downtown Sioux Falls. The Visual Arts Center is home to six galleries and features changing exhibits including the new Infinite Variety gallery committed to showcasing South Dakota artists. The Husby Performing Arts Center is home to the 1,800-seat Mary W. Sommervold Great Hall, which offers a wide variety of touring Broadway productions, symphonic/musical concerts, national/international dance tours and more.

[Orpheum Theatre](#)

The Orpheum Theater is listed on the national register of historic places and is located in the heart of Sioux Falls on Phillips Ave. It serves as the home stage for the community theater and Sioux Falls Jazz & Blues Society. Musicals and plays are staged throughout the year with group tour pricing available for each show.

The Olde Towne Dinner Theatre is committed to celebrating the art and the joy of community theatre. Its quaint and intimate setting is perfect for a group tour.
